

May Organ Crawl

On an overcast spring day on Saturday, May 6, members of the Lehigh Valley Chapter journeyed to our neighboring Chapter, Pennsylvania Northeast, for an enjoyable Organ Crawl. Organized by Tom Dressler, Sub Dean, the group visited five very interesting organs. The tour began at the Church of the Epiphany in Glenburn with a 2 manual Karl Wilhelm tracker instrument. The second church, St. Peter's Cathedral in Scranton offered a 3 manual Casavant tracker in North German Baroque style. A 3 manual Schlicker rebuilt by Patrick Murphy at Covenent Presbyterian Church also in Scranton was the third stop. Hickory Street Presbyterian Church in Scranton, the fourth stop, featured a 3 manual 1920-ish Casavant organ. Finally, the Austin/Skinner/Berghaus organ at St. Stephens Episcopal Cathedral in Wilkes-Barre brought the tour to a conclusion. The variety of various organs and the architecture and acoustics of each church were particularly interesting and the warm hospitality of each venue was appreciated by the group.

Recital, Annual Meeting and Banquet

A highlight in the program schedule for the Lehigh Valley Chapter is the annual Banquet and Concert presented by a Rising Star among organists. On Sunday, May 21, chapter members and friends gathered at Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, Perkasie, Pennsylvania, for this outstanding event. The



event was hosted by Andrew Lutz-Long, Director of Music Ministries for the church. The recital was presented by **Adam Bergstresser**, a native of Nazareth, Pennsylvania, and a recent graduate of Westminster Choir College of Rider University in Princeton, New Jersey where he earned a Bachelor Degree in Organ Performance and Sacred Music. While at Westminster, he studied organ with Alan Morrison and Daryl Robinson and improvisation with

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Peter Conte and Alejandro Consolacion II. Outside of Westminster, Adam continues to study with his long-time mentor, Thomas Dressler, a relationship that began in 2009 at a POE sponsored by the Lehigh Valley Chapter.

Currently, Adam serves as Director of Music Ministries and Organist for St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Doylestown, Pennsylvania. In addition to organ and administrative responsibilities, Adam directs St. Paul's Ringers and the Westminster Quartet and also collaborates with Dr. Joseph Ohrt in the direction of the Senior Choir.

Adam's program was described as an "immense success" and he was complimented for his imaginative registrations. His repertoire included works by Sweelinck, J. S. Bach, Brahms, Mendelssohn and Liszt. The organ at Trinity Lutheran is a three-manual Reuter installed in 2004 with additional digital voices by Walker Technical Company.



Report from Round Lake

The Victorian village of Round Lake, New York, is located about halfway between Albany and Saratoga Springs. It was originally founded as a Methodist camp meeting location. At first, people stayed in small tents, which were replaced by small buildings that then became small, colorful Victorian houses, and people eventually began living there year-round. In the center of the village is an auditorium, where all the major events took place. At first, it had a wooden frame and canvas sides. Eventually the canvas was replaced with permanent walls. And in 1888, the Round Lake Camp Meeting Association bought an organ from Calvary Episcopal Church in New York City. When the instrument was completed by William H. Davis and Richard M. Ferris in 1847, it was one of the largest and most sophisticated instruments in America.

The **Davis-Ferris organ** was relocated to Round Lake and installed by a local builder, Giles Beach. The organ remains in its spot on the auditorium stage, and has hardly been changed. In fact, it retains more than 90% of its pipework and is the most intact example of a pre-Civil War American organ. This year, the Interior Department designated THE ORGAN (NOT the auditorium) a National Historic Landmark. It is the first and only musical instrument with this designation!

Thomas Dressler, our dean, has performed on this organ for the past 27 years and was thrilled to be part of the festivities on June 10 celebrating the organ's new landmark status. If any of you are going to be in the upstate New York area near Saratoga Springs, a visit to this organ is well worth your time. It sounds unlike any other organ, taking you back to before the Civil War. Remember, 1847 is the year Mendelssohn died! If you have an interest in visiting the organ, contact Thomas Dressler.


