

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That being said, I can think back and remember some hurdles I had to get past. By the time I was in my late 30s, I realized I knew enough repertoire that I could, if I wanted to, go through a rotation of recycling preludes and postludes for church and mixing up recital programs in a way that I might not need to learn new repertoire. I think probably many of us reach a similar point by the time we're about 40, and I have known some musicians who did choose the route of slowing down the learning process. I remember feeling I could have done that, but instead I challenged myself. I decided that every time I played a recital, I'd include at least one new piece in the program unless I was really in a pinch for time. This actually required me to step up my learning of new pieces, so I had to put forth a little more energy in my practicing. At the same time, I decided to revamp my technique somewhat, so I had some real challenges for someone in his late 30s and early 40s.


But what was the result? This is just me, and I'm sure results vary from person to person, but in my case, the feared loss of ability to learn and physically perform has not materialized yet, and I am now 56. Instead, I can say with confidence (and a bit of incredulity) that I learn FASTER and more thoroughly than I ever did when I was in my 20s or 30s! For me, and based on the studies I have read I bet for others too, the ability to learn and apply skills is a cumulative process. I am sure the time will come when I start to feel a decline, but it has not happened yet. I truly believe we can delay that if we don't settle into becoming "experts," but maintain our curiosity and use our years of experience to work in a progressively more focused way.

So, Easter is over . . . it is a great time to get out some new music and let your curiosity and love of music lead you to keeping your mind and skills youthful! For those who are younger, hopefully this gives you something to work towards and look forward to (as long as you stay curious), and for those of us who are older, it is exciting to know we are in a field that will allow us to make discoveries and apply our skills well past the time athletes and people in other professions experience decline in abilities!

Let's get out some new music!

Organ Building Lecture

Vincent Schaper Organ builder, Potsdam, Germany April 28, 2018; 10:00 am Advent Lutheran Church 470 Landis Road, Harleysville, PA 215.256.9941

An engaging speaker, Mr. Schaper will discuss the history of organbuilding in Germany, with a specific focus on organs in Brandenburg state. He will also

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discuss the evolution of the style and sound of the Schuke company, which began in 1820. Since then, they have been building organs rooted in the style of the 17th and 18th century masters. However, the company also embraces state-of-the-art science and technology. With some audience interaction, Mr. Schaper will include hymns as an example of the importance that singing has held in the history of the Schuke workshop for generations.

Refreshments will be served, and participants are encouraged to bring a brown-bag lunch and join us immediately following the presentation.

Vincent Schaper, a native of Potsdam, Germany has been affiliated with the Alexander Schuke company since 1986, when he began his vocational



training there. His duties have included maintenance, voicing, tuning, building, sales manager, and project manager. His background also includes business administration, film and music making. He is a keyboard and bass singer whose musical training began in 1975. He has played in several bands, and has been an active church musician.

LVAGO Co-Sponsored Recital Guidelines

- 1. The deadline to apply for a Co-Sponsored recital with the LVAGO chapter is April 1.
- A proposal must be sent in writing, via email or cover letter, from the proposed hosting congregation to the executive committee of the LVAGO chapter. The letter must include the following info:
 - time, date, & location of recital
 - name of recitalist
 - recitalist's recital fee (no extras—housing,

- meals, transportation, etc.)
- tickets, suggested donation, or free will offering for recital
- LVAGO Chapter members are granted free admission to Co-Sponsored recitals. Chapter members are not required to contribute to suggested donations or free will offering at Co-Sponsored recitals.
- 4. Recitals must be in the afternoon.
- 5. The LVAGO chapter agrees to contribute 50% of the recitalist's fee up to \$1500.
 - Extra recitalist fees such as housing, transportation, meals, etc. are not covered by the LVAGO chapter and must be covered by the hosting congregation.
- 6. The LVAGO chapter is to receive 50% of ticket sales, suggested donations, and or free will offerings.
- 7. The proposed recitalist and hosting congregaton will be a determining factor in regards to the executive committee's decision. Application does not necessarily imply acceptance.
- 8. The organist at the hosting congregation must be a current member of the LVAGO chapter.
