It's quiet in the Poconos in January (at least where I live.) There is snow on the ground, and more on its way. There is noticeably more daylight, and as I sit in my chair, forced to stop doing things for a number of days by a case of the flu, I am contemplating how our work can mimic or be attuned to the seasonal rhythms.

Ideas are coming for the upcoming year at my church, we are into a new budget year, and I have to start making plans for what we'll do this year. I'm actually happy to have a month or two without big projects to bring to fruition. I grew up on a farm, and though my grandfather did not farm it on a large scale at that point, we did have a very large garden. In January, the seed catalogs would come and we'd

start dreaming of what we were going to plant and the wonderful flowers and vegetables we'd have by the end of summer and into fall. It always started in January with the dreaming.

There are wild seeds, like milkweed, echinacea, sycamore, etc, that actually need this cold, frozen time to overcome their dormancy and germinate in the spring. And over the years, I have found this to be true with my practicing. There are times to work on pieces, and there are times to let them

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rest for awhile. Doggedly pushing oneself past a certain point with difficult pieces is not only unproductive, but many times it's counterproductive.

And just like the month of January was a month of dreaming of the upcoming growing season when I was a kid, there are times when I believe it is necessary to get away from the organ with difficult pieces and imagine you are conducting someone else playing them. There are times when we need to connect to the dreaming about our pieces, to the imagination, to get away from being bogged down with the technical problems that are stopping us from reaching our goals.

I will never forget a lesson with Bernard Lagacé in Montréal. When discussing technical problems with a certain piece, he said (with his heavy French accent), "We are a whole person, body and soul. If we have the right concept of a piece, the technique will fall into place." Now that is not to say that technical work is unimportant. It was addressed to getting past the hump where you work and work for little to no improvement. The idea was to get away from the keyboard and dream about how the piece would go unfettered by technical problems. This can produce some really good results, much better than blindly banging one's head against a wall.

I believe there are times to work hard on difficult pieces. Then there are times to get away from the keyboard and conduct or dream about how they should go. And there are also times when we need to just stop practicing particular pieces and realize that, just like the milkweed seeds under the snow, this time is necessary for germination. I have found that for myself, I rarely perform a piece in public until it has been through all of these stages, including dormancy. That means that for pieces like Bach Preludes and Fugues, even though I might learn the notes in a certain amount of time, it may take a year for me to feel I have a settled interpretation.

What does winter, snow, quietness, even having the flu teach me?

Patience.

Bach Marathon Concert


