Dean's Mixtures

Breath. Pneuma.

Going through some stressful times recently has reminded me of the importance of breath... not just THAT we breathe, but HOW we breathe. And this led to some reflections on the organ and how we play it.

Our instrument uses large amounts of air, but the thing that distinguishes it from most wind instruments is that the air is supplied to the organ in limitless quantities. We do not have to stop to let the



instrument take a breath (unless there is something really wrong with its winding system!) This unlimited air supply is one thing that contributes to the majestic and otherworldly sound of our instrument. At the same time, if we want to make the instrument "sing," we need to be aware of the limitations of singers' lungs and how they breathe. While our instrument is capable of playing lines that are unyielding and (theoretically) infinitely long, if we want the music issuing from the organ pipes to sound human and unlike a computer, we have to consciously add the same limitations a singer grapples with. We have to take time at phrase endings to breath, we have to analyze our music and add these "lifts" in a way

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that resemble a person taking a breath. Adding the illusion of limitation to our playing makes it sound more natural, more musical, and I think it also allows listeners to empathize with our music making.

Nowhere is this consciousness of human breath more important than when we lead a congregation in hymn singing. There is hardly anything more difficult to follow (and possibly stress inducing—see below) than trying to sing with an organist who does not give people time to breath. I find that the best way for me to keep in touch with the natural breathing process of singing is to sing along as I play hymns. I've done this from the time I learned that skill (and it is not easy at first to sing along as you play four parts on the organ) and I continue to do it to this day.

Singing has a calming effect on the human body. If you Google "breathing, blood pressure," you'll see that controlled breathing, where the exhalation is slower than the inhalation, stimulates the vagus nerve and lowers blood pressure, turning off the fight-or-flight response. The important thing is to take deep diaphragmatic breaths and control the exhalation. This is so effective that devices that help with breath control have been approved by the FDA for blood pressure control. It's worth doing some research on the benefits of yoga breathing...

Breath or "pneuma" signified more than just air to the Greek stoics. It signified the life force, or the soul—the fragment of God that is within us. It was seen as a combination of air and fire. Upon reflection, it has some interesting resemblances to the Holy Spirit in Christian theology. It is what gives us life.

I can hardly think of a better way to celebrate life and even increase our health than to sing. And as organists leading congregational singing and directing choirs, we help those around us breath better by being aware of breathing and always sensitively incorporating the need to breath into our organ playing. We CAN play without the limitation of needing to breathe, but that does not mean we SHOULD.

Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954 in Fosston, Minnesota) is currently Professor, College Organist, and Chair of the Music Department at Hood College in Frederick, Maryland, and Director of Music Ministry at First Lutheran Church in Ellicott City, Maryland. An active composer, author, performer, church musician, and clinician,



Wold holds a Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) degree from Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, Virginia; a Master of Sacred Music (MSM) degree from Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio; and a Bachelor of Music (BMus) degree from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. He earned the certification of AAGO (Associate of the American Guild of Organists) and received the "Alumnus of Excellence Award" in 2015 from Shenandoah Conservatory. He is editor and frequent author of a monthly column entitled "Musicians on the Side" in the journal *The American Organist*. Wold is the author of three books, numerous articles, and dozens of anthem and hymn texts. His published compositions number over 300 and include works for organ, adult and children's choirs, and various instrumental ensembles, plus a children's musical and psalm settings and hymn tunes that appear in numerous hymnals in the U.S. and Australia. He served on the editorial committee for the hymnal Evangelical Lutheran Worship. He has presented numerous recitals and improvised hymn festivals across the U.S. and in Europe and has performed as harpsichordist with the Maryland Symphony Orchestra, the Hood Chamber Players, the National String Sinfonia, the Frederick Symphony Orchestra, and Bach in Baltimore. Wold is an active member of both the Baltimore and Central Maryland Chapters of the American Guild of Organists (AGO), a member and past regional president of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM), and a member of The Hymn Society in the U.S. and Canada, and he has led workshops for all three organizations. Since 2018 he has served as Regional Councillor of the Mid-Atlantic Region of the American Guild of Organists.






